- New landscaping out front thanks to Andy and the Distribution crew for updating the landscaping and hanging new flagpoles.

- The interview process for two meter reader positions is underway. We have interviewed 3, and have 2 tomorrow. We also have an opening at the WTP no luck finding a qualified candidate for the operator job yet. We may need to either recruit or hire a trainee.
- Next week we will have a fourth site visit from Project 1641.

# **March 2017**

- Completed all reports.
- All Emergency generators were ran by Dell Hughes. The emergency diesel engines were also ran and were reported as operating fine.
- Collected 28 Distribution Samples and analyzed for the presences of Coliform Bacteria. All samples were within acceptable range.
- The chlorine burn out was started on Feb. 3<sup>rd</sup> and ended March 1<sup>st</sup>.
- We are currently maintaining an average Total Chlorine Residual level throughout the distribution system this month at 1.17 mg/l.
- Heyward Co. rebuilt the GA valve on the #1 High Service pump.
- Performed preventive maintenance on the Quincy air compressor.
- Performed preventive maintenance on the Sludge Tank mixer.
- Fabricated pipe stand for the Ferric overflow piping.
- Removed and cleaned the piping and Venturi pressure ports on the Finished
   Water flow measuring devise.
- Replaced all non-working lights in the Chemical room and men's restroom.
   Replaced 3 bulb connectors.
- Repaired the #1 Willet sludge pump dampener
- Replaced the light switch in the Raw Water pump house.
- Adjusted the packing on #3 Raw Water pump.
- Replaced the Raw Water sampling pump at the pump house.
- The sludge removed and sent to the landfill this month was 102.58 tons.

KJ's Market Grocery Store - The meter should be installed on the fire service line in the next couple of weeks.

#### Caustic Feed Day Tank and Ferric Chloride Tank Replacement

We are reviewing the bid documents currently.

#### In-House Projects

Nella Line Replacement - This project will begin after Magnolia.

Magnolia Line Replacement – Projected to start construction within the next couple of weeks. The ordered material has all been delivered.
